Hanslope Bell Restoration Project

I am pleased to report that things are finally progressing with regard to the Hanslope Bell Restoration Project. We have received a date of Monday 8 July from Whites for work to commence on the project and the bells to be removed from the tower. This date is dependant upon a couple of things happening and/or being in place before then. A structural engineer is due to visit in early March, as requested by the Oxford Diocesan Guild with reference to the faculty, which will hopefully then be awarded. Two beams also need to be installed above the bells, which will enable Whites to use them to mount the hoists for lifting the bells.

We are still approximately £15,000 short of our total required amount of £80,000. However, the church has made the decision to proceed with the project and schedule further events to raise this final amount while the project is in progress.



Joseph Slater 1893 - 1918

Joseph James Slater was born in Loughton in 1893, the third child of William and Elizabeth (nee Adnitt) Slater. He had 6 siblings – Violet, Percy, Martha and 3 others that died in childhood.

The Slaters were originally from Bedford where Joseph's grandfather started out as a brick-layer before re-training and becoming a hospital nurse. Joseph's grandmother was a dress-maker, an occupation his mother subsequently took up. Joseph's father was a coach builder for the railways, moving from Bedford to Newport Pagnell in the 1880s.

Sadly, Joseph's mother died in 1910 at the age of 48. His father re-married in 1911, Lizzie Adnitt of Northampton who was Elizabeth's cousin.

In 1911, Joseph, his father and brother Percy lived in 58 Priory St, Newport Pagnell.

In 1915, Joseph married Dora Maud Jones and they had two children – Olive in 1916 and Joseph in 1917. They were living in Loughton.

Joseph enlisted at Bletchley in the 5th Battn Yorkshire Regt.

In May 1918, the regiment was in Craonne and it appears Joseph was wounded on the 12th May. He died of wounds on the 14th May 1918 and is commemorated at Beaurepaire French National Cemetery, Pontavert.

Joseph Slater was 25 when he died. He was awarded, posthumously, the Victory Medal, and the British War Medal.

To commemorate the death 100 years earlier, of Sgt Harold George Kitchener DCM, aged 21 of the 6th Bn. Northamptonshire Regiment, the sixth Loughton man to die in the Great War and buried in Daours Communal Cemetery.

This quarter is also the second QP in the Mayor of Milton Keynes' Challenge

Harold Kitchener 1897 - 1918

Harold George Kitchener was born in Loughton in 1897, the eldest son of George Ernest and Alice Sophia (nee Dance) Kitchener. He had 5 siblings – Grace, Kathleen, Leonard, Gwendolene and George.

Harold's father was a baker, the family living in Beech Cottage in Loughton in 1911.

In 1911 Harold took up a 5-year apprenticeship as a wheelwright and carpenter with Frederick James Lay of Turvey. Harold was 17 when he enlisted in Bedford in 1914 in the Bedfordshire Regt, later moving to the 6th Battn Northants Regiment. He was one of the first young men from Loughton to volunteer to serve their country. He went to France in July 1915 and saw action on the Western Front including the battles of Albert, Bazentin Ridge, Delville Wood, Thiepval, and Ancre, and in August 1916 was promoted to Sergeant. During 1917, engagements included, the Third Battle of the Scarpe, the battles of Pilkem, Langemark and Passchendaele and in 1918, the battles of St Quentin, Avre, Villers-Bretonneux, Amiens, Albert and Bapaume. In August 1918 with the 6th Battn, Northants, Harold was awarded the DCM 'for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty' for his actions in reconnaissance between 22-25th August.

On 21 August the British Third Army launched an attack intending to drive the Germans back towards the town of Bapaume. This ground was chosen as it was less torn-up by years of shelling, and thus better suited to mobile attacks with armoured support. The roar of artillery, somewhat muffled by the heavy blanket of fog which prevented observation beyond 100 yards, broke out in the east. Fighting continued and on the 25th August, the New Zealand division began to surround the town of Bapaume, where several major roads intersected. The German defenders resisted the siege until the night of 28 August, when they retreated to positions just east of Bancourt and Frémicourt.

Harold was 21 when he died of wounds on 30th August 1918 almost certainly sustained at Bapaume and is buried in Daours Cemetery which at the time was almost in the front line.

He was awarded, posthumously, the Victory Medal, The British War Medal and the 1915 Star Harold is commemorated on the Fenny Stratford war memorial as well as in Loughton.

Herbert Kitchener 1886 - 1922

Joseph Herbert Kitchener was born in Loughton in 1886 to Charles and Esther Mary (nee Slatter) Kitchener. It was a twin birth – sadly his brother Cecil died soon after. Additionally, Herbert had 2 sisters – Florence and Constance.

Herbert was a cousin to Arthur Kitchener, also commemorated on the Loughton war memorial (their mothers were sisters) – and Arthur was uncle to Harold who we commemorated in August.

Herbert's father and grandfather were bakers while his mother's family were farmers of a large farm of around 100 acres in Deddington, Oxon. However, by 1911, his father ran a grocery and beer-house while living at Mount Pleasant in Loughton.

Herbert and his sister Florence lived in the Grocery Shop in Loughton in 1911 where she was the manageress and he was the assistant. Probably the same shop his father ran. His other sister, Constance, was a teacher at the village school.

It is not clear when or where Herbert enlisted – nor where he fought. Although he survived the war and returned home to Loughton, he must have been suffering – whether physical wounds or the effects of gas poisoning – from which he subsequently died as he is listed as 'war dead' on the Loughton war memorial. He was 36 when he died in 1922 in Northampton. Both his sisters married and continued to live in the area.



Eric Purvis 1896 - 1918

Eric Purvis was born in Northampton in 1896, the eldest son of William Frederick and Mary Ann (nee Smart) Purvis. He had 1 brother, Wilfred. His father's family were Northampton shop-keepers while his mother was from Wales where her father was a village police constable.

His father was an author and editor. He wrote 'South Africa, It's People, Progress and Problems' published in 1897 and was awarded the MBE in 1918 after working in the Food Production Office during the War.

Originally from Northampton, in 1901 the family was in Holborn in London but by 1911 they were in Simpson Rd, Fenny Stratford.

At the outbreak of war, Eric was already building a reputation at the Royal Agricultural college in plant and animal breeding. He was also a well-known all-round athlete in Buckinghamshire.

Eric was 18 when he enlisted at Aylesbury on 1st Sept 1914 in firstly, the Ox and Bucks Light Infantry, then the 11th Battn of the Royal West Surrey (the Queens) Regt which was made up of mainly Kitchener Volunteers. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 1915.

By Feb 1916 the battalion was stationed in Aldershot and were mobilised for war landing at Le Havre, then taking part inconflicts in France and Flanders. In Nov 1917 they were deployed to Italy to strengthen the Italian resistance. In March 1918, deployed back to France, Eric would have seen action in the Battles of St Quentin, Bapaume, Arras, Ypres, Courtrai and finally action of Ooteghem (25th Oct 1918). Already wounded twice previously, Eric was killed on 25th October 1918 while involved in heavy fighting to capture the village of Heestert.

Eric Purvis was 22 when he was killed in action and is buried in Heestert Military Cemetery in Belgium. His mother, Mary Ann Purvis lost her father, sister and son in the same year.

Eric Purvis was the author of a number of popular entertaining sketches about army life published in 1918 which he had written while recovering from wounds in Ireland. He also collaborated on a book of army games and several agricultural and horticultural textbooks and was an expert writer on bee-keeping.

He was awarded, posthumously, the Victory Medal, and the British War Medal.
