Emberton

The ringers, at their practice at All Saints on Tuesday 23 July, celebrated the birth of Prince George of Cambridge by dedicating a touch of 120 changes of Cambridge Surprise Minor to his arrival.

Shenley & Loughton ringing outing 1st June 2013

Not many outings start where you can see the ropes on the spider but can't actually work out how to get them down. We were met at Thurleigh (15 cwt 6), just north of Bedford, by the wife of the tower captain, but she wasn't a ringer and was unable to help. Thurleigh is unusual in that you ring from the beautiful open chancel area, accessible to everyone, so they have taken measures to secure the ropes without the use of lock and key. We could see a blue rope attached to the top of the spider, but the obvious blue ropes on the wall just released the clock hammer and rang the sanctus bell. A search party went up to the bells to trace the rope from the spider to where it returned to the chancel. More head scratching followed until a secret door was found – success! All went well until we wanted to reattach the ropes at the end. Without the weight of ropes on the spider to lower it, we had to find a chair to stand on to pull it down. So, unusually, just getting our hands on the ropes proved more of a challenge than ringing the bells.

Kimbolton (17 cwt 6) was next, a small characterful town, with plenty of parking in the wide high street, which has Kimbolton Castle at one end and the church at the other. The ringing room was on a balcony open to the church, similar to Newport Pagnell. A lovely set of bells, very enjoyable to ring.

A short drive away across the beautiful river meadows of the Huntingdonshire countryside was Great Staughton (18 cwt 6). These were more difficult to handle, with a relatively long draught, which left us ready for our lunch at The Exhibition pub in Godmanchester. They have a spacious restaurant which allowed them to seat all twenty of us on one long table and the food was excellent.

Suitably restored, we made our way to St Mary the Virgin, Godmanchester (19 cwt 8) at which we tried out some triples and major, a challenge for most of us. The tower captain there asked where we'd had lunch and told us his nephew was the chef at The Exhibition and he'd previously worked at The Savoy Hotel in London, which was why the food was so good. The tower captain kindly allowed us to stay for longer than we had booked, as we had an hour's gap before we could ring at the next tower, Brampton (13 cwt 6), who had a wedding. As we turned up, so the wedding party were just coming out, though not going far as there was a marguee in the churchyard. The bride and aroom had more than they bargained for as we took over the ringing for another three guarters of an hour. This ringing room was small, but home to 14 ropes as they have a set of 8 separate ropes for their simulator (which allows them to ring all 14 if they want!) The anticlockwise ring gave us more to think about than usual in the call changes, but we were pleased to achieve a well-struck course of London.

Finally a short trip southwards down the A1 took us to Little Paxton, a 7 cwt 6, augmented from 4 in 2011. The lady who met us had learnt to ring then at the age of 78 and is still part of the enthusiastic band. Unfortunately the neighbours are not so enthusiastic so we had to stop promptly at 6 p.m. The most memorable aspect of the ringing room was the glass floor over the main door of the church, where you stand to ring the 2 and 3. This presumably makes it easy for the band to judge when to start to ring for weddings, but also gives the congregation a view of the ringers which makes it advisable to wear trousers!



The traditional outing photo was taken and we wended our way home, having renewed our appreciation for the differences to be found within the churches of England.

Ringing at Shenley

Branch Summer Social and Striking Competition

This year's Branch Summer Social and Striking Competition was hosted this year by St Lawrence, Bradwell Village on Saturday 8th June 2013. There was a keen chilly wind but those attending were treated to a sumptuous range of cakes and drinks supplied by the host church.

Eleven teams entered the competition and we were extremely grateful to our Judges Mr & Mrs Richard Yates who braved the cold and sat in the churchyard to judge the competition.

The overall results were as follows.

Great Linford 10 faults Woughton 11 Newport 14 Youths 16 Bradwell 19.5 Loughton 23 Emberton 23.5 Wavendon 34.5 Shenley 40.5 BRP Girls 52 GATE 54.5

These are the comments made by Richard Yates:-

General comments: The ringing has been interesting. Some experienced bands and some bands without a lot of experience has created variety. I do 'nit pick' a little, but please do not be discouraged. It is important that you work at striking as the bells are the loudest voices of mission.

Very easy to ring doubles as you have the tenor as a regular beat at the back, but it can also work to your disadvantage. One or two teams have picked up faults through erratic tenors. Also some teams did not ring one minute of rounds, and I marked them slightly down for this. *(Some dispute here as someone had written 'rules' on a whiteboard which said only 20 rows of rounds.)*

Team 1 Newport 14 faults

Minor, very good striking, overall reasonable rhythm, let down occasionally by leading of small bells. Good use of practice time. No large faults in this.

Team 2 GATE ringers 54.5 faults

A less experienced band. Did not use your practice time well enough. Very good try. Slightly irregular rows. Period in middle where settled down.

Team 3 Youths 16 faults

Good rhythm, rounds picked up faults through backstroke leading. Error in third course.

Team 4 Woughton 11 faults

Very good rhythm throughout, faults picked up by the tenor but very good piece of ringing.

Team 5 Loughton 23 faults

Slightly erratic, but nice piece of ringing.

Team 6 Emberton 23.5 faults

Slightly slower piece, good tenor ringing. Slight difficulty in the beginning of the fourth course. Slow and methodical.

Team 7 Shenley 40.5 faults

Tenor picked up the faults, although they were mainly just half faults.

Team 8 Bradwell 19.5 faults

Short practice and a long test piece! Big gap after the test piece – was there a team talk going on? Of limited value in my experience..... A very measured performance and a nice piece of ringing.

Team 9 Wavendon 34.5 faults

A call change team. Improved as time went on, though the test piece went on and on..... Only marked the required time. But they were really getting into their stride.

Team 10 Great Linford 10 faults

Very little to say about this team as it was a very good piece of ringing. But they did appear to have a second start, and I chose not to penalise them for this as it was a Branch 'friendly'. (There was some discussion about this afterwards and perhaps that is why Woughton is going forward instead.)

Team 11 Big Ring Pull Girls 52 faults

A call change team, picked up most faults on the changes, but a good effort.

It has been agreed that Woughton will represent the branch in the Guild Striking Competition.

This year we met up in West Sussex, and Sheila Watts, Carrie Walker and Sheila Ware were the organisers.

It was nice to see Gordon and Lindy Ellis from Norfolk, who used to ring at Newport and Lavendon. It was heartening to have so many younger ringers joining us now, and helping to run the ringing.

We rang at six towers on the Monday and Wednesday, and at five on Friday, the other days being free for sightseeing in the beautiful South Downs countryside. Two special methods had been earmarked for the week – South Downs Little Treble Bob Minor and Sussex Churchwardens Pleasure Doubles - but we only had time to achieve the Minor method. We enjoyed some good ringing on the lovely bells which had all been recommended by a local ringer, a friend of Jonathan Griggs. There were no lockouts during the week, but it was a close call at one of the towers where the tower captain had mislaid his key. The solution was interesting....he turned up with a large screwdriver and took the ringing chamber door off (see photo)!



We all enjoyed a good week's ringing holiday and are already looking forward to next year.

Plain Bob Minor – Our band, easily recognised by the number of ringers with little experience of competition ringing, theirs by the number of peal ringers of long standing. With that in mind, we went about it the right way with sensible band placing and a touch that kept the tenors together. As it turned out, that was our downfall as it fired out just after the first single. Call Changes – A similar gulf of experience here with BigRingPull ringers to the fore and the ringing steadily improved, helped by some steady leading. We still came second.

There were few method mistakes and the touch actually came round, which is always the first target. So we came 2nd again but proved we were better than we thought.


Branch DVDs to borrow.

The branch now has a number of new DVDs available to loan out to members free of charge.

'Ropesight' is a collection of video tutorials providing the key steps in learning the fundamentals of change ringing. The DVD focuses on the three stages of mastering bellringing: learning bell control and achieving ropesight, becoming proficient in ringing methods, and finally, conducting your first touch. Learning the Ropes' is an ITTS DVD which demonstrates the key skills in teaching a new ringer to ring from the teacher's perspective. In addition it shows the full teaching cycle for a new recruit from first holding the rope through to ringing a bell competently and safely. If you are interested in teaching people to learn to ring then this is a useful resource.



We also have a DVD made up of the clips that were used in the presentations at Downs Barn as part of the Big Ring Pull. Nick has put together clips from other ringing DVDs to make this a useful video to show members of the public what ringing is all about.

2013 Young Bell Ringers Cycling Tour, Cheshire and Flintshire.

This year was the 40th annual Young Bell Ringers Cycle Tour organised by Rev Geoff Stickland, the retired vicar, formerly of Quedgley, Gloucestershire.

This year the tour was centred on Gladstone's Library in Hawarden, near Chester and each day we cycled a different circular route to pick up 4 or 5 towers.

The term "Young" is a bit arbitrary for most of the tourists, but it make us all feel better, especially on the hilly bits! There were 33 of us on the tour each taking a turn to run a tower on the ingenious routes organised by Geoff and depending on map reading skills and choice of routes covered between 150 and 200 miles in the week with ringing at 27 towers. Some really keen members also joined ringing at local practice nights.


Young Ringers from the Branch in York
