Branch DVDs to borrow....

The branch has a number of DVDs available to loan out to members free of charge.

'Ropesight' is a collection of video tutorials providing the key steps in learning the fundamentals of change ringing. The DVD focuses on the three stages of mastering bellringing: learning bell control and achieving ropesight, becoming proficient in ringing methods, and finally, conducting your first touch. You can see clips of the DVD at www.bellringingfilm.co.uk

'Learning the Ropes' is an ITTS DVD which demonstrates the key skills in teaching a new ringer to ring from the teacher's perspective. In addition it shows the full teaching cycle for a new recruit from first holding the rope through to ringing a bell competently and safely. If you are interested in teaching people to learn to ring then this is a useful resource.

We also have a DVD made up of the clips that were used in the presentations at Downs Barn as part of the Big Ring Pull. Nick has put together clips from other ringing DVDs to make this a useful video to show members of the public what ringing is all about.

More recently, David held the Guild Rep post in 2008 and 2009 and during that time developed the Ringing Development Leader role we now have, taking on the Newport Deanery in 2009. Most of us would like to think we have made a difference and an improvement. David has also done that in Olney with a fine ring of 10 thanks largely to his concerted effort and project management skills.



In earlier years, some time in the 1980's, a cricket match was arranged between North Bucks and Leighton Buzzard ringers. I don't know if anyone knew who was on which side. I think David made a few runs though.

St Paul's Cathedral, London

Since moving to London last September to study Law at Greenwich University I have been fortunate enough to be invited to ring for Sunday services at St Paul's Cathedral. This involves ringing for the two morning services and Evensong. The 12 bells are situated in the North West tower of the Cathedral and even though there is a spiral staircase from the base of the tower, this is not used for security purposes. This means that reaching the ringing chamber is quite a journey! The journey starts by going through a gate in some railings opposite the north side of the Cathedral (in a line of offices in St Paul's Churchyard), down some steps which then takes you through a passage way under the pavement into the Crypt, checking in at the security office and then making your way through the underground 'builders yard' to the public part of the Crypt. We then wait until everyone has assembled (approximately 14 ringers are always booked to make sure that there are always 12 to ring – extra ringers then volunteer to be stood down). The 12 ringers then go up in a modern lift to the Triforium level in the Cathedral where we walk along the south side of the Cathedral, past many artefacts etc. not on public display, to the west end. At the west end we continue across the gallery (giving a really good view down the Cathedral nave to the east end), through a room used by the Cathedral's seamstresses and then up a few steps of the spiral staircase into the ringing room.

The ringing room looks like many others apart from the fact that all 12 bells have a box to stand on due to their size, and the peal boards are not `boards' as such, but the records of the peals rung e.g. for Winston Churchill's funeral, the Coronation of HM The Queen etc. are actually painted on to the walls of the ringing room. The windows of the ringing room also give good views across the City.

Once the band has been placed, we ring 4 or 5 courses of Stedman Cinques, or a plain course of Surprise Maximus, which takes us up to five minutes before the service. The tenor is then rung as the five minute service bell.

Whilst it can be a bit intimidating ringing at St Paul's as a high standard of ringing / striking is expected at all times, I have found the ringers to be welcoming and friendly. After the two morning services at St Paul's we usually go and ring after the service at St Michael's Cornhill and occasionally, St Magnus the Martyr.

I feel very privileged to ring at St Paul's Cathedral and my thanks go to Alan Marchbank who started me on my ringing career.

INSURANCE COVER

The Guild Treasurer, Stuart Gibson, has recently clarified some issues relating to the Guild insurance and the Branch Officers felt it ought to be brought to the attention of members.

Please make your tower members aware of these facts.

The ringer's insurance that we all pay for out of our subs as Guild members is for personal accidents to ourselves (Group Personal Accident Insurance). It pays out if we are injured, temporarily or permanently through ringing. It also covers death.

There is, however, no Public Liability component in this policy.

The Guild does have Public Liability insurance for Guild training events. Our normal practices, teaching and Service ringing are not deemed Guild events.

North Bucks made use of an extension to this policy to provide Public Liability cover when we used a mini-ring in Middleton Hall for the Big Ring Pull.

Each Church should have its own Public Liability insurance covering activities within each Church. As the Tower Captain is appointed by the Church (not the Guild) the Church has the responsibility to ensure that the activities within the Church are covered by their own Public Liability cover.

In summary, Public Liability cover for bell ringing in our Churches needs to come from the Church. This is most likely to be in place, but it might be wise to check.

A letter from the Ringing for England Campaign

Dear Secretaries,

I wrote just before Christmas to again request your kind help in encouraging your towers to join in and ring out on April 23^{rd.} We are now in our fourth year and how well so many of you have contributed to creating a growing and successful campaign for St. George's Day. The point of this letter to you is to spur you on and to help support and encourage even more ringers to take part.

As I write Burns Night is being celebrated and so it should. But on April 23rd England has a double act for it not only is St. George's Day but Shakespeare's Day and how proud we should all be of such an inheritance. It is a sad reflection on our times that a BBC Cricket correspondent when asked recently by his Australian counterpart 'How do the English celebrate their national day'?' he meekly replied, for all the world to hear as it was going live, that nothing much happened and that, as a nation, we really didn't do anything in particular. So this is the key to why Ringing for England was formed.

Such is the growing interest by the general public that a PR company has most generously come forward to help broadcast the efforts made by all bell ringers to a far wider audience and engage with people of note to help spread the word. And part of this exercise is to engage and inform people in the media (eg: cricket correspondents!) that most certainly something is very definitely happening. In turn this has a knock on benefit of reminding the public how fortunate they are to have in their midst so many volunteer bell ringers who form an integral part of our communities, which, again in turn, will hopefully encourage new ringers to come forward.

The more towers that ring out the more the public will hear and the greater the campaign will become and then as night follows day we will have a truly nationwide event.

This is such a worthwhile cause with a hugely untapped groundswell of public support which will be my role to play in and inform. I will keep you all informed of progress and in return, in order to help me help you, I would very much appreciate it if I was kept up to date with what the towers hope to do on the day.

Last year more regional radio stations and regional newspapers covered the occasion than before. I am hoping with the PR company on board we can now inform a far wider nationwide audience and gain their support and goodwill.

Lest we forget......

Whiteland, Greenland and Brownland, all sound like some places from a children's story book, but in September 1913 these were the countries mapped out on the countryside of North Bucks and South Northants. Watched by their majesties King George V and Queen Mary with Baden Powell and a young Winston Churchill also in attendance, the British Army were on manoeuvres, much to the excitement of the locals.

Fast forward to 1914 and Britain was at war, and many of 50,000 men who gathered on the fields of North Bucks were in France holding back the German advance. As the war continued into 1915 the call for young men to "join your country's army" grew stronger. Young men from across the country joined up and amongst these were bell ringers from our branch. Sadly some of these brave young volunteers were destined never again to hear the bells of North Bucks.

We have been discussing how we as a branch want to remember our fallen bell ringers. Local newspapers tell us that the bell ringers of the time rang half muffled peals or quarter peals on receipt of the sad news and it seems fitting that we remember these young men in the same way their peers did.

But first we need to complete our research, can you help? We have some names but we'd like know a little more about each these young men. For example: do family members still live in the area? What do they know about their relative? Do they have a photograph they are willing to share with us? Did any of young men complete a peal at their local tower, is that recorded on a peal board in the tower? Does their name appear on a local memorial can you take a photo and send it to us?
