Branch News

BRANCH TRAINING DAY, SATURDAY 11TH OCTOBER

The Branch Training Day this year was on Ringing Up and Down in Peal. It is an area of ringing which many ringers struggle with and there are often limited opportunities to practise the skill as raising and lowering in peal is generally only down once at a practice night (or not at all at some towers).

A total of ten participants signed up for the course and 18 helpers volunteered to help out on the day. The course consisted of four sessions – two morning sessions held at Milton Keynes Village and Loughton and two afternoon sessions held at Bradwell and Wavendon. Each session was run by a different leader. This meant that the participants had the benefit of different teaching styles and viewpoints and lessened the burden on the leaders who only had to run one session.

All the participants were already competent in raising and lowering a bell, but most of them picked up tips on improving their technique. Everyone was able to have several goes at raising and lowering in peal and all felt they had made progress and improved by the end of the course. Some participants were also interested in learning how to lead up and down and, again, were able to have a few goes at that too.

A big "thank you" goes to all the helpers. It was quite a tiring day with lots of raising and lowering, but the course could not have taken place without them. The participants, in their feedback, had high praise for the helpfulness, friendliness, knowledge and experience of all the helpers which meant they were able to get a lot out of the course.

There was a welcome break for lunch at the Talbot in Loughton where participants and helpers were able to come together and compare notes; and there were refreshments in the form of tea, coffee and biscuits during the sessions to keep everyone going.

Several of the course participants have already put what they have learnt into practice at their home towers which is perhaps the best measure of success for the course.

THE NBB EIGHT BELL BAND

We have held two more practices in the last quarter. At **Great Brickhill** we rang Cambridge S Major for those who are consolidating the method and we had a further "learner" who rang their first blows of the method. The evening saw our first foray into Yorkshire, with one of the "learners" ringing it perfectly having rung it for the first time only the evening before. The Yorkshire was well struck and a number of people commented on how good it sounded.

We also added three leads of Kent TB Major to our repertoire and rang it a couple of times – again a first for at least one ringer, and I suspect others. At the Stony Stratford practice it took us at least 3 attempts to get the starts right, which shows how much we have progressed as a band. In between we rang various Plain methods and Stedman.

We did not hold a practice in November but used the opportunity provided by the **Branch quarter peal week** to get a number of people through 8-bell quarters. All were successful; scoring two firsts of Surprise Major (Cambridge inside for both) and a first quarter peal of Surprise Major on the treble for someone who is paying me handsomely to not say for how many years. What a superb and rewarding effort, with the individuals concerned commenting that they have never had to concentrate so hard for years! Thanks go to the bands that helped make these quarters a success

These practices are held **once a month rotating around the local 8-bell towers**. They are held on the practice night of the local band but run by the branch so a big thank-you to those towers for allowing us to take over their practices and hopefully they will let us come again.



HOLIDAY RINGING

The following Sunday we rang at Vancouver (8, 16 cwt) again joining locals most of whom were ex pats, and again rang plain hunt, and grandsire. We then rang at Victoria (10, 29 cwt) on Vancouver

Here we managed Cambridge minor, a method that the locals hadn't rung for a long time.

What did all three towers have in common? The local ringers made us very welcome, were very pleased that we joined them (especially since it was also their holiday time which meant some of their own ringers were away on holiday) and they were keen to point us in the right direction for coffee shops, restaurants and other sites off the regular tourist trail.

MILTON KEYNES BELLS IN UNUSUAL WW1 COMMEMORATION

Many communities throughout Britain have commemorated the centenary of the start of the First World War, and ringers have been involved in quite a few of those commemorations. However, at Simpson in Milton Keynes, this involvement took a unique form – the bells were an integral part of a piece of music especially composed for the occasion by a local composer.

Simpson is now part of the New City of Milton Keynes, but in 1914 it was a large village just outside the small urban complex of Bletchley and Fenny Stratford. Almost 90 men went off to war. Eleven were killed. Simpson remembered them at an evening of readings and music in St Thomas' Church on September 6th.

A band of ringers drawn from the neighbouring towers of Woughton and Wavendon rang half-muffled Grandsire Doubles as the audience arrived - nothing exceptional in that. What followed was more unusual.

The first half climaxed with three "Songs for Simpson" by local composer David Baume. The third, called "The Village of Santa Claus" (apparently an old nickname for Simpson, but that's another story), told the history of the village from its first mention in history to its incorporation into the New City. The song started with bells ringing in back rounds, a theme then picked up by the organ accompaniment. The piece finished with the organ playing a descending scale, a theme picked up by the bells ringing rounds. The composition was modern in style, but tonal – indeed the key, A flat major, was chosen so that the piece was in tune with the bells.

Brian Baldwin, the captain of the Woughton ringers, commented: "The hardest part was coming in on cue - the belfry and the body of the church are quite distant. We are really glad to have been able to take part - I think ringing as part of a piece of music is a unique experience for all of us".

The ringers' contribution to the proceedings didn't stop at the belfry door - the keyboard accompanist for songs sung throughout the concert was another ringer, Jean Mattinsley.



FROM TOWERS TO TRENCEHS, WE REMBER THEM.....

Many of us rang half muffled in commemoration of the start of World War 1 in August. In the August edition of In Touch Doug reported that the impact of the first few months of the war on the branch was minimal, after all it would "all be over by Christmas".

As the first signs of spring were appearing in Clifton Reynes and Newton Blossomville the British Expeditionary Force (BEF), after months spent defending French territory in miserable sodden trenches, was preparing for an attack. The light fall of snow on the evening of the 9th of March 2015 was replaced by a damp mist by the next morning. The peace of that misty morning was broken at 7.30am by the roar of shells exploding on the German front line and in the village of Neuve Chapelle. By 8.05am the bombardment was over, the heaviest that would be fired until 1917, and the troops of the Army Cyclist Corps joined the BEF attack. Among them was 24 year old private Frederick Charles Andrews .

Frederick Andrews was the 5^{th} son of farm labourer John and his wife Mary, he was born 13^{th} April 1890 and went to the local village school. Frederick was a Clifton Reynes member of the North Bucks branch between 1907 and 1909. He joined the Volunteer Corps at Olney before enlisting in the Middlesex regiment on the 1^{st} March 1910, from there he served in India, Malta and Guernsey before joining the BEF in France from Oct 1914.

He was wounded in the Battle of Neuve Chapelle and died of his wounds the next day, 14 March 1915. Frederick was buried in the Merville Communal Cemetery, Plot II.E.3. His family were either not given the chance or could not afford to pay for a personal inscription to be added on his headstone. Instead just his rank, surname and initials and date of death were recorded.

We will be holding this year's AGM on the centenary of his ultimate sacrifice in his memory and we hope that as many of you as possible will be able to join us. If you can't join us perhaps you could commemorate him too by ringing half muffled during that week.

Our new website now contains a section devoted to those members that served and lost their lives in The Great War, just scroll down the on the home page to find the banner link. We will be adding the life stories of the bell ringers over the course of the next few months and of course would welcome any further information you may know about these brave young men.

Communication

Group messaging:

Doug explained to the meeting that Gary Reading on behalf of the branch committee had been exploring suppliers who could give us richer functionality for branch notifications.
